Ephesians 5:22-24

Wives, Submit

Main idea: Wives are called to submit to their husbands as the Church submits to Christ.

I started planning this sermon a few weeks ago, not realizing that I would be preaching it on our anniversary.

- Once I realized it, I did what any wise husband should do: I asked my wife.
- And here's what she said. She said, "That's funny." But then she said, "I'm not worried. I trust you."
- Now, even at this point, I thought, "I need to be careful."
- But I also know my wife, and she would always be honest with me about these things.

Wives are called to submit to their husbands as the Church submits to Christ: fully loved, and fully empowered.¹

Read Ephesians 5:22-24

It's interesting that people often see the Bible as old-fashioned on this issue.

- But the Bible's teaching actually elevated women!²
- In those days husbands were seen as the authoritative leaders of the home.³
 - But Christianity dignifies women by clarifying that wives are not slaves.⁴
 - And even more than that, men and women are partners in life and ministry. [Genesis 2:18]
 [Romans 16:3-4]
 - Because all of us, not just women, are to be devoted primarily to Jesus.⁵

So submitting to your husband involves recognizing that each of us have certain roles and responsibilities.⁶

- This passage is not reducing a woman's value.
- It's showing how Christian relationships are meant to reflect Christ's love and the Church's trust.
- It invites all of us to understand our closest relationships in light of the gospel: not based on domination or obligation, but on love and grace.⁸
- In fact, in any relationship where we seek to reflect Jesus, we're called to love and act out of humility.9

In one sense, we're all called to submit to one another. (v. 21)

- So wives aren't called to be subservient to their husbands. They're not the only ones called to submit.
- And yet, there does appear to be a special way that wives are to submit.¹⁰

The context very clearly tells us how wives are to submit, and to whom. (v. 22)

- They are to submit to their own husband (not to men in general).
- In the animal world, many animals have what's called pair bonding.¹¹ [photo]
 - They live in community with others, and yet are devoted primarily to their mate.
 - o In the same way, God gives a family to love and serve, and we're to be devoted to them. 12
- It also says that wives are to submit as to the Lord. It's an expression of their faith.
 - To submit does not mean to obey. This was the command to children and slaves, not wives.
 - But submit also does not mean the opposite of submit, like to defy. [word study]
 - We don't want to fall into the error of swinging the pendulum too far the other direction.
 - Certain expressions of the feminist movement today seem to say that women should defy their husbands, live independent of their husbands, and don't need men for anything. [chart]
 - And any rational person would, I hope, see that every woman needs a man to open a jar for her once in a while.

- Healthy relationships thrive not on power struggles, but on mutual support and trust.
 [Romans 12:10]
- Also, submission is not about hierarchy: it's about humility, and seeking the good of the other.
 - You see, submission is a gospel response, not a forced role. 15
 - "As to the Lord" means it's an act of worship as you trust in Christ.
 - And this kind of trust in Christ applies to all of us.¹⁶
 - Even though I don't follow basketball at all, I think it's a great example of this. [video]
 - You can have an amazing shooter, but you're not going to win a championship unless the whole team knows how to work together.
 - We fulfill our purpose best when we lay aside our desire for our own glory. 17

In the same way, the act of submitting itself is a picture of the gospel. (v. 23)

- Submitting reflects the relationship between Christ and the Church.
- Husbands are called to be like Jesus: sacrificial, loving, servant leaders.
- The Church submits to Christ not because of domination, but out of love.
- Likewise, wives submit not because of weakness, but out of trust in God's order.
 - Making up our own order is a recipe for failure. [photo]
 - The call here is not for husbands to command and wives to comply; it's for both to reflect the dynamic beauty of Christ and the Church, each playing a part in love.¹⁹
 - We'll talk about it more next week, but husbands also have an impossibly high command to obey: to lay down their lives, just as Christ did for His Church.²⁰
 - And the truth is, all of us are called to reflect Christ in how we relate to one another.²¹

Because, once again, it's all about worshiping Christ. (v. 24)

- Now, we should be clear here: "in everything" does not mean in sin, abuse, or blind obedience.
- It means in every area of life, the attitude of respect should be present as you serve Jesus.
 - So we've talked a lot about what submitting isn't, but what is it? (v. 33)
 - o In the end, submitting means respecting, and I would say, especially not disresecting.
 - Respect is what most men crave; not control, but to be valued and trusted.
 - When it comes down to it, don't marry someone you don't respect.²³
 - And if you're already married, pray for humility and trust: not trust in your husband's perfection, but trust in God's design.²⁴
 - The perfect example of all this is the woman in Proverbs 31.
 - She supports her husband by working hard. 25
 - She values her husband by speaking well of him and building him up. ²⁶
 - She submits by willingly aligning her actions with what will bless him and their family.²⁷
 - You see, a wife's submission is not silence or slavery, it's strength under control.

Ultimately, all of this is not about roles for roles' sake. It's about reflecting Jesus in our relationships.

- It's about both spouses choosing humility, choosing grace, and choosing love, again and again.
- It's about living out a relationship that says: "We belong to Christ. We serve each other. And we walk together in love."
- And when we do that, we show the world what the love of Jesus looks like in real life.
